- Administrative category: The geo-reference; at what spatial scale is the analysis conducted. – National, sub-national, municipality, metropolitan, district, neighborhood, census tract, statistical area, residential units
- Unit new: unit of analysis – space, people

- Extent movements: the scale at which the residential moves are studied – national, inter-urban, metropolitan, intra-urban, within neighborhood
- Country: country of analysis
- Country NEW: countries classified according to region
- Number cities: number of cities studied in analysis
- Cities: the cities studies in analysis
- Segregation: conclusions authors have made regarding segregation – increase in ethnic segregation, increase in ethnic and income segregation, increase in income segregation, desegregation
- Origin: identified origin location of gentrifier
- Destination: identified destination location of displace
- Phase: phase of gentrification studied
